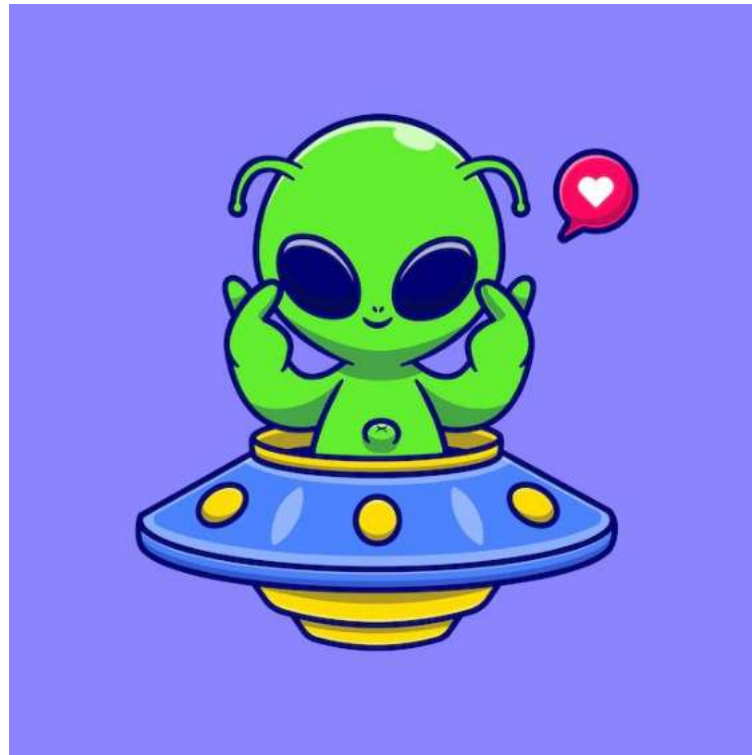

## How to ask “what is your job?”

Che	lavoro	fai?
What:	job	(you) do?

## How to answer

Faccio	<articolo>	<lavoro>
(I) do	the	<job>

Sono	<lavoro>
(I) am	<job>



Notice that if you want to answer with “I am a student” to the question “What’s your job?”, you don’t normally use the article.

A: Che lavoro fai?

B: Sono studente.

A: What’s your job?

B: I am a student.





**Lex:** Ciao! Come ti chiami?

**Mario:** Mi chiamo Mario,  
piacere.

**Lex:** Piacere, io sono Lex. Che  
lavoro fai?

**Mario:** Faccio l'idraulico, e tu?

**Lex:** Io faccio il leone.



Idraulico means plumber.  
Leone means lion.



## Anche

The word **anche** means “also”. It is placed before the word it refers to. So, pay attention:

Italian example	English translation
Io sono un'insegnante	I am a teacher
Anche io sono un'insegnante	I am a teacher too (I am a teacher like you)
Io sono anche un'insegnante	I am also a teacher (I have another job, I'm not only a teacher)





## How to make the feminine of jobs

Ending of masculine	Ending of feminine
-o	-a
-iere	-iera
-ista	-ista
-ante	-ante
-tore	-trice
-ore	-essa
+ others	+ others

**Note:** for foreign words, the noun is invariable, only the article might change.

Notice the i that is not pronounced but is there.

In Italian, **medico** (doctor), **agricoltore** (farmer) and many more jobs' names have no feminine counterpart. On the other hand, **la guida turistica** (the tourist guide) is always feminine, even when it refers to a guy.
